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Structure, Governance and Management

The Society was founded in 1910 by Canon Charles Wilmer Foster, and subsequently endowed by Kathleen Major, with the object of printing records and documents relating to church, parochial, manorial and family history of the county and ancient diocese of Lincoln.

Policies to enable the Society to achieve its charitable objectives are determined by its Council of trustees, which meets once or twice each year. An annual report and any changes to the governing document are put before members at the Annual General Meeting, usually held in October. The day to day running of the Society is delegated by Council to the Finance and Publications Committee and to its Officers.

Membership is open to all, on payment of the annual subscription, currently set at £18 for individuals in the UK, and £20 for institutions and overseas individuals, in return for which, members are supplied with the publications of the Society. Subscriptions are due on 1 August each year, but members may join at any time during the year and receive a full year's benefit. Most of the Society's publications deal with Lincolnshire, but some of the volumes include matter relating to the counties of Bedford, Buckingham, part of Hertford, Huntingdon, Leicester, Northampton, Oxford and Rutland, which were in former days included in the diocese of Lincoln. Members are entitled to purchase back volumes at a discount.

The governing document is reproduced here.

The Rules of the Society are:

1. The Society shall be called the LINCOLN RECORD SOCIETY (hereinafter referred to as the Society).

2. The object of the Society shall be the advancement of public education in the history of the ancient diocese of Lincoln and the county of Lincolnshire especially by the transcription, editing and publication of original historical documents. The word 'Diocese' in this clause shall include any counties which have at any time formed part of the Diocese of Lincoln.

3. Membership of the Society shall be constituted by the payment of the annual subscription, or, in the case of life members, of the composition.

4. The annual subscription shall be determined from time to time by the trustees and shall be payable on the first day of August in every year. A composition of an amount twenty times that of the annual subscription shall constitute life membership from the date of composition.

5. The management of the affairs of the Society shall be vested in a Council consisting of the president, secretary, general editor, treasurer and a number of at least seven and not exceeding twenty other members of the Society to be elected at the annual general meeting. Vacancies occurring between annual general meetings may be filled by the Council. Three shall form a quorum.

6. Each member shall be entitled to one copy of every work published in the main series by the Society in respect of his year of membership. No person shall receive any such volume until his subscription for the year in respect of which the volume is published has been paid, provided that any member may be supplied with any of the publications, including additional series, on such terms as the Council may from time to time determine.

7. Persons who are not members of the Society may be supplied with the publications of the Society on such terms as the Council may determine.

8. The funds of the Society, including the vouchers or securities for any investments, shall be kept at a Bank to be selected by the Council in the name of the Society. Such investments shall only be dealt with by an authority signed by the Secretary and such other person or persons as the Council may from time to time appoint.

9. The accounts of the receipts and expenditure of the Society, and of its assets and liabilities, up to the 31st July in each year, shall be scrutinised in accordance with relevant legislation for the time being by an appropriate person or body to be appointed by the Society.

10. An annual general meeting of the members shall be held in the Autumn, to receive a report upon the work of the Society and the General Editor's report, to receive the Treasurer's financial statement and to elect an appropriate scrutineer in accordance with Rule 9, to elect officers and a council for the ensuing year, and to transact the general business of the Society.

11. The Council may require the accuracy of any transcript, calendar or translation to be tested on their behalf before it is printed.

12. The editor of a volume shall be entitled to receive five copies of the work.

13. The Secretary shall keep a minute book wherein shall be entered a record of the transactions as well at meetings of the Council as at general meetings of the Society.

14. The rules shall only be amended at a General Meeting called for that purpose giving at least 21 days notice of the proposed amendment. No amendment shall be made to the constitution that would cause the Society to cease to be a Charity at Law. Any alteration to the constitution must receive the assent of not less than two-thirds of those present and voting. Any amendment to Clause 2 or Clause 15 or this Clause shall require the prior approval of the Charity Commissioners for England and Wales.

15. The Society may be dissolved by a resolution passed by a two-thirds majority of those present and voting at a General Meeting. In the event of dissolution, any property remaining after the satisfaction of all debts and liabilities shall be given or transferred to such other charitable institution or institutions having objects similar to the objects of this Society as the Charity Commissioners or other authority having charitable jurisdiction may determine.

Objectives and Activities

The Society's objects are noted above.

Activities are established by the trustees to meet and accord with the Society's charitable objectives. In addition to the publication of historical documents relating to the diocese and ancient county of Lincolnshire, the Society also makes grants for research and other purposes which, in the opinion of the trustees, will further the Society's objectives. The Society also organises events for its members and the general public which help to achieve its objectives.

Public Benefit: The Trustees having regard to the guidance issued by the Charity Commission in deciding what activities the Society should undertake, the Society makes its volumes freely available to the general public by appointment with Lincoln Cathedral Library where two sets of its publications are held. The Society's volumes are also stocked by many public libraries and archives, and are available for sale to non-members on payment of the cover price in force for the time being. The Society's website and Facebook page are available to all internet users, and contain information about its work, publications, grant-making programme, linked organisations, and events open to the general public.

Volunteers: the Society's trustees are all volunteers, and it has not yet needed any other volunteers who are not trustees. It is estimated that the trustees contribute some 1000 - 1500 hours per annum of their time to the running of the Society. The equivalent financial benefit of these hours of professional time may be in the region of £100,000 per annum.

LINCOLN RECORD SOCIETY TRUSTEES' REPORT FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 JULY 2013

Achievements and Performance

Membership: This year the Society welcomes 23 new members and notes the resignation of 10 members. We are sorry to report the deaths of the Stephen Barnes and Trustee Hilary Healey. At the end of the year the Society had 383 members compared with 372 at the end of last year.

Publications: During the year, The Country Justice and the Case of the Blackamoor's Head was issued to members as the volume for 2012. Edited by two members of the LRS, Brian Davey and Rob Wheeler, it comprises editions of two distinct sources illustrating the practice of the law in Lincolnshire during the later eighteenth and early nineteenth centuries. The justice notebooks of Thomas Dixon of Riby (1787-1798) represent a rare survival, illustrating the dispensation of justice by a country magistrate outside the formal courts of Quarter Sessions. The second part of the volume consists of papers relating to the lawsuit Thorold v. Catton (1830-1838). An arbitration of a dispute relating to a remote beer house (the Blackamoor's Head), this lawsuit throws much incidental light on the activities of the 'bankers' engaged in improvements to the adjoining river, and of the cattle drovers who paused overnight on their way from Scotland down to London.

The volume for 2013 will be the first part of the General Editor's Lincolnshire Parish Clergy 1214-1968: A Biographical Register, covering the deaneries of Aslacoe and Aveland. This will be issued to members at the end of November. It will be followed by Diana and Michael Honeybone's edition

of The Correspondence of Maurice Johnson and William Stukeley, which is now in the hands of the General Editor and will go to the printers early next year. Other volumes in progress include The Rolls of Bishop Robert Grosseteste (Philippa Hoskin); The Pelham Survey 1585-1587 (Rod Ambler); Memoranda of Bishop John Buckingham (Alison McHardy); The Goxhill Leiger (Nicholas Bennett); Petitions from Lincolnshire c.1270-1509 (Gwilym Dodd and Alison McHardy); and The Alvingham Cartulary (Jill Redford). A number of new proposals are under consideration. The publication schedule of the Society is dependent upon the commitments of editors and it is not possible therefore to give definite dates for the publication of volumes in active preparation.

Other Activities: This has been another active year for the Society. In October 2012 volume 102 (The Country Justice and the Case of the Blackamoor's Head, eds. Brian Davey & Rob Wheeler) was successfully launched before several dozen members and locals in Riby church, North Lincolnshire. Brian Davey gave a stimulating and very enjoyable lecture on the rare justice's notebook of Thomas Dixon of Riby, and an excellent tea was prepared by the villagers. Rob Wheeler gave a similarly stimulating lecture on the Thorolds of Harmston at the AGM shortly thereafter. Over two days in April 2013 the Society sponsored a conference for early career researchers New Perspectives on Medieval Lincolnshire, organized by Marianne Wilson and Alan Kissane. More than sixty delegates attended the conference at Lincoln Cathedral Centre and heard over a dozen excellent papers on varied aspects of the history of the medieval county and diocese of Lincoln, with keynote lectures given by Council members Professor David Stocker and Dr Alison McHardy. Two volumes of the Society's Newsletter have been published in this year. Edited by Marianne Wilson, the Newsletter combines news, reports on conferences and other events, notice of forthcoming events and short research articles. The Newsletter is distributed to all members. The Society has also launched a Facebook page, sharing news and updates with members online. The annual LRS prize for the best dissertation at the University of Lincoln has been awarded to Martin Turner, while The Dulcie Duke Award has been made to Mrs Maxey.

Grants: Of the £10,000 approved by Council for grants during the year a total of £7,500 was awarded. £3,500 was awarded to the Heritage Trust of Lincolnshire towards a new book about salt making in the county by Tom Lane. Its title will be Salinae: The Story of Saltmaking in Lincolnshire. £4,000 was awarded to Stamford and District Local History Society towards the publication of the Browne's Hospital account book by Professor Alan Rogers.

Legacies: There are no new legacies this year

Financial Review: The stock market improved during the year and our investment portfolio increased from £42,484 to £46,283. The income from these investments was £2,084 which is less that last time as there was a disposal of an investment in 2011/12 that was taken as income rather than being reinvested. Interest rates continue to be low with no sign of any increase. Income from the Charities Official Investment Fund was £3,727. Members of the Finance and Publications Committee are in discussions with our advisors Brewin Dolphin to change the structure of our portfolio with the aim of increasing our investment income.

Membership increased slightly during the year and this is reflected in the increase in membership income to £7,075. The Finance and Publications Committee considered the annual subscription and plan to increase it to £25 for all members from August 1st 2014. More details will be sent to members during the next financial year. Book sales from the backlist held up at £1,642 only £46 less than last year.

Expenditure is £20,000 higher than last year. This comprises of two items. A grant of £16,000 to Lincoln Cathedral for the two year period from June 1st 2013 and a grant of £4,000 to the Stamford Survey Group towards the cost of Professor Alan Rogers book on the Stamford Accounts. The Cathedral grant is in support of their appointment of Dr. Nicholas Bennett as part time Keeper of the Muniments. In return the Society will continue to receive the services provided by the Dean and Chapter. Under charity accounting rules these grants are shown in the current year although they will not be paid until future year.

The result for the year is generally in accordance with our budget and five year plan approved by Council in October 2012.

Surplus funds are invested in the Charities Official Investment Fund which is managed by the CCLA. Regular monitoring and review of investments is undertaken by the Finance and Publications Committee. Investments are held by Brewin Dolphin in a nominee account.

Reserves Policy: The balance held on the Major Reserve will be held in line with a suitable price index. The remaining funds are available for application and the Trustees have instigated a grant making programme. The Trustees will retain general reserves adequate to fund the average cost of one publication and a certain level of grants to assure the future of the society. The five year plan has been designed with this in mind.

Plans for the future: At the 2012 AGM members agreed to a change in the rules to permit the introduction of two new series. The Kathleen Major series for medieval books and the Occasional Series for other subjects that cannot be included in the main series. These publications will be paid for by selling advance subscriptions to individual volumes. We plan to start publishing volumes in 2014. There will be more details in the New Review.

I report on the accounts of the Trust for the year ended 31 July 2013 which are set out on pages 8 to 12.

Respective responsibilities of Trustees and Examiner

1 ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The following accounting policies have been used consistently in dealing with items which are considered material to the charity's affairs.

a Basis of accounting

These financial statements are prepared under the historical cost convention and in accordance with the Charities Act 2011, applicable accounting standards and the Statement of Recommended Practice "Accounting and Reporting by Charities" (2005).

b Legacies

Legacies are recognised when the sum to which the charity is entitled is known.

c Subscriptions

Subscriptions are recognised in the period to which they relate.

d Investment income

Interest on deposits is accounted for in the period when it was earned.

e Expenditure

Expenditure is included in the year to which it relates rather than the year in which it is paid. Expenditure includes irrecoverable VAT. Support costs are those costs incurred in running the charity's activities. Governance costs relate to strategic overall management of the charity.

f Fixed assets and depreciation

Fixed assets are included at cost less depreciation. There is no formal capitalisation limit. Depreciation is calculated so as to write off the cost of an asset, less its estimated residual value, over the useful economic life of that asset as follows:

Facebook Project	over 3 years
Digitisation Project	over 5 years

g Investments

Investments are stated at market value at the balance sheet date. The Statement of Financial Activities includes the net gains and losses on revaluations and disposals throughout the year.

h Stock of books

Book publication costs are written off as incurred. Stock is not valued in the accounts.

i Funds

Designated funds have been identified by the trustees and set aside for a specific purpose as described in the notes to the accounts/trustees report. General funds are those funds which are available to the trustees to apply for the general purpose of the charity.
